### **NLS Launches Quarterly Patron Corner Programming**

As part of the Patron Engagement Section's mission to offer services, resources, and programs to enrich the library experience for patrons, the National Library Services, NLS will host a quarterly Patron Corner virtual event where patrons can learn more about various services directly from NLS staff. The quarterly Patron Corner will occur on the second Monday of the third month of each quarter. The next quarterly Patron Corner will occur Monday, December 12 @ 7 pm. The program will be interactive, last for one hour, and have a designated topic of discussion. Guests will be members of the Collections Division at NLS responsible for selecting the books in the collection. ### **NLS Updates to BARD**

NLS has released version 1.4.5 of the BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Download) Mobile Android app. This release brings major improvements, bug fixes, and increased stability since the March 2022

release. Users who have not enabled automatic updates (as recommended by the NLS) will need to perform the update manually through Google's Play Store. BARD Mobile users can confirm that they are running the latest version by checking the bottom of the app's settings screen. NLS plans to follow up quickly with a v1.4.6 release to address additional bug fixes. NLS has also released version 2.0 of BARD Mobile for iOS devices. In this version, the BARD website option is replaced by a new and powerful search engine. ### **BARD Support: The Many Faces of BARD**

For many patrons, BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Download) can be intimidating, but it doesn't have to be. That's why the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled now offers a free, monthly educational series called, The Many Faces of BARD, provided by the Patron Engagement Section of NLS. This series will take place on the second Thursday of every month at 7:00 pm ET. Each session will be an hour and will focus on one area of BARD and how to use it; they will begin with a brief presentation about the main topic, followed by audience questions about the subject and BARD usage in general. At the end of each session, NLS will announce the subject for the following meeting. This program is open to all patrons. #### **Braille on Demand!**

As part of its braille modernization initiative, NLS launched the Braille-on-Demand pilot project this past summer. This project will allow active patrons to request and receive one hardcopy braille title per month to KEEP for their personal use. Braille titles will be limited to books currently available on BARD. ### **Large Print NLS Catalogs Ceasing Publication**

Due to the ongoing worldwide paper shortage and significant increases in printing costs, NLS has decided to cease production of all large-print serialized publications. These publications – Talking Book Topics, Braille Book Review, and Musical Mainstream – will continue to be available in other formats, including hardcopy Braille, Audio magazine, online, dial-up from NFB Newsline, and PDF.

## The Haunting Season: Eight Ghostly Tales for Long Winter Nights by Bridget Collins (DB 105999)

Eight master storytellers of the sinister and the macabre pen seasonal ghost stories for an original anthology. In Andrew Michael Hurley's

"The Hanging of the Greens," a man once devoted to God cautions about good deeds during the holidays. Occult. Ghosts, Supernatural. Violence, strong language, some explicit descriptions of sex. 2021.

### **The 19th Christmas** by James Patterson (DB 96863)

When a fearsome criminal known only as "Loman" seizes control of the headlines, December is upended for the Women's Murder Club. Loman is planning a deadly surprise for Christmas morning and commissioned dozens of criminal colleagues to take actions that will mask his plans. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. Mystery/Detective 2019.

### One by One by Ruth Ware (DB 100607)

A French Alps trip for the team of a trendy London-based tech company starts out as a typical corporate retreat. But as soon as one shareholder upends the agenda by pushing a buyout offer, tensions simmer. When an avalanche leaves them stranded, the group dwindles one by one. English fiction. Suspense. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2020.

# The 13<sup>th</sup> Gift: A True Story of a Christmas Miracle by Joanne Smith (DB 80286)

Journalist describes receiving mysterious gifts on the twelve days leading up to her first Christmas alone following the death of her husband. Details her efforts, with the help of her three children, to identify the sender of the gifts, and the impact the gifts had on them. Autobiography. Short book. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2015.

Winter Storms by Elin Hilderbrand (DB 85810)

The Quinn family brace for a huge storm at the Winter Street Inn on Nantucket. Kelley Quinn hopes he has beaten his cancer diagnosis while his adult children try to sort out their lives. Sequel to Winter Stroll (DB 82793). Holiday celebrations. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2016.

### **Rhode Island Special Needs Emergency Registry**

Information provided by the Rhode Island Department of Health. Enrolling in the Special Needs Emergency Registry lets police, fire, and other first responders in your community better prepare for and respond to your needs during a hurricane, storm, or other emergencies. Many people may need extra help during a time of emergency, including people who:

- Use life support systems such as oxygen, respirator, ventilator, dialysis, or a pacemaker; or for those who have chronic conditions and require treatment (such as, diabetics requiring insulin)
- Have mobility needs and use a wheelchair, scooter, walker, cane, or other mobility devices
- Are visually impaired, blind, hard of hearing, or deaf
- Have speech, cognitive, developmental, or behavioral health disabilities
- Use assistive animals or a prosthesis.

The information submitted to the Rhode Island Special Needs Emergency Registry is shared with local and state first responders and emergency management officials. Your information is held confidential and only accessed to assist your safety and well-being. The Department of Health and Rhode Island Emergency Management Agency have worked with E-911 to notify first responders when responding to a household that may have someone enrolled in the Registry. While enrolling in the special needs registry does not guarantee assistance, this notification allows first responders additional time to consider how to best respond to that incident. Please note that strict confidentiality is always maintained, and only those with a reason to access the information are authorized to do so.
